LIAISON WITH PARENTS

This school has an 'Open Door Policy' and encourages parents to take an active part in their child's education and school activities and events.

The school seeks to inform parents of school activities through Parent/Teacher Interviews in November and February, Individual Education Plans (as necessary throughout the year), Questionnaires, a September 'Meet the Teacher' Parents' Meeting, an Annual School Report - issued in June 2019, new parent induction days and other specific school events including Book Fairs, Coffee Morning and Sports Day.

The P7 parents were given guidance on the transfer procedure. Annual SEN reviews are conducted with parents, SENCO and relevant teachers.

PTA

This year the school asked the PTA to continue to help purchase replacement interactive panels for the classrooms. A great team of parents, staff and pupils enjoyed a year of fundraising activities, which included designing Christmas cards and mugs and creating memorable events such as a Glow Party. They had regular second hand uniform sales and clothing collections. The PTA continued to raise funds through Easy Fundraising shopping. We were very pleased that they raised a total profit of £1,219.48. This helped towards purchasing an Imex board in the P4/5 classroom.

The PTA had planned many other activities but due to the pandemic, and school closures, these did not happen.

The PTA continues to be a member of Parentkind and is still waiting to be called forward by the Charity Commission to formally register as a charity.

The PTA usually meets once a month and all parents, from nursery to P7 are very welcome to come along to meetings.

NEWSLETTER AND WEBSITE

The Orchard County Newsletters and school website continue to provide information which celebrates school achievement and prepares families for all activities.

Our school website, which was established with School Web Design for the main school and nursery, enables you to view pupils' class activities, these are regularly displayed. Information/forms/menus/letters are also available for parents.

The school app can be downloaded on to parents' devices to aid effective communication. Messages and emails can be sent directly to parents through the school website.

CROSS PHASE - LINKS WITH LOCAL SECONDARY SCHOOLS

Staff from local Secondary Schools visited the school and spoke to P7 pupils. P7 pupils also visited local Secondary Schools for a musical, activity based days and Open Nights.

THE CURRICULUM

The Governors are confident that Orchard County Primary School continues to provide a safe, secure and stimulating learning environment and offers a great variety of learning opportunities suitable to the needs of each pupil. Staff expertise and resources are well utilised to assist each child as they strive to reach their maximum potential. Due to reduced government and EA finance, the staff attended fewer courses organised by RTU, CCEA, ETI, the EA and other agencies but they have still been able to keep up to date with the ongoing changes and developments within education via online training and Shared Education courses.

All classes have been involved in leading whole school assemblies and parents are very welcome to attend when their child's class is leading assembly.

The staff continues to engage in a range of strategies to support under achievers in both literacy and numeracy. Additional SEN support was again given both individually and in groups alongside Reading Partnership Sessions and Literacy support from a teacher within the EA's Literacy Peripatetic Service.

Due to the pandemic and the sudden school closure, the staff quickly upskilled and provided excellent remote learning. Staff provided remote learning from March to June. This was provided for all pupils, Nursery to P7 through Google Classroom and the Home Learning section of the school website. We had a whole school online Hot Chocolate Friday, an online sports day and P7 final assembly, to celebrate the achievements of the P7 pupils. The staff participated in online training and staff meetings.

ACHIEVEMENT

Academic progress has been maintained on every level and our reports reflect a school where the vast majority of children appreciate the importance of striving to always give their best. Our high level of good manners and respect for others has always been maintained and most importantly, both inside and outside the classroom, pupils have further developed the excellent name of Orchard County Primary School.

Standardised testing was postponed to the autumn term of 2020.

ETI PRIMARY INSPECTION 9th March 2020

Due to industrial action by the teaching unions, the school staff were advised not to participate in any ETI school inspection process. The inspectors were therefore unable to observe teaching in the classrooms. They were however invited to the whole school assembly and met with the Principal, the senior leadership team and Chairman of the BOG. The Safeguarding team agreed to cooperate with the Safeguarding aspect of the inspection only (like approximately 85% of NI schools).

The Leadership Team of the Designated Teacher, Mrs Davidson, the Principal, Mrs McMillan and the Chairman, Mr Twyble, met with the inspectors to present and discuss the ETI safeguarding proforma and their safeguarding responsibilities.

The parent, staff and pupil questionnaires were not distributed due to the industrial action.

A selected group of eight P6 pupils were chosen by the inspectors for a discussion about school life and safeguarding.

The inspectors reported back their findings to Principal and Designated Teacher.

The ETI thanked the leadership team of the Principal, Designated Teacher and Chairman for engaging with them and for providing the safeguarding proforma, policies and for allowing access to the P6 pupils. They explained that it was ETI's legal duty to carry out the safeguarding aspect of the inspection and that the outcomes would be limited due to the industrial action. They explained that they can only comment on the evidence at the time of inspection.

Key Findings

ETI reported that the P6 pupils spoke maturely and respectfully about school life. The children articulated their views confidently and were able to explain the skills they are developing through working with others in roles such as librarians, 'digital leaders' and members of the eco-committee and school councils. They talked about their important roles within school and how they contribute to the decision making within school.

The pupils were very positive about school life and stated that they were happy in school. They talked a lot about their friends from St Patrick's PS and spoke very positively about Shared Education. They also spoke positively about the wide range of extra-curricular activities offered to them in school.

They spoke positively about school and their learning. They highlighted their enjoyment of using information and communication technology to support their learning and they are well informed about how to stay safe online. They stated how school was a safe place and they were very aware of who they could speak to if they had a problem. They spoke positively about 'Hot Chocolate Friday' and how they could chat to Mrs McMillan at this time. They were very well informed about how to stay safe online.

Safeguarding- the ETI reported that the evidence provided (ETI Safeguarding Proforma, related policies and information file) reflects broadly the guidance from the Department of Education. ETI explained that this is the highest level possible without seeing the out workings of the safeguarding by observing pupils in the classroom. The report was published on the ETI website on 24th April 2020.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR

2019/20 has been a very busy year in the life of Orchard County. We have had great success in and out of the classroom again this year. As usual the children have had the opportunity to take part in a wide range of after school activities, hockey, netball, football, rugby, tennis, badminton, cross country, swimming, Eco club, cookery, choir, knitting, and guitar clubs.

We were involved in our third year of Shared Education with St Patricks and P7 you participated in a wide variety of fantastic activities and made a few new friends along the way.

We started our year with a brilliant coffee morning organised by these P7 pupils and raised an amazing amount, £660 for **MacMillan Cancer Care**. This is always so well supported and a great school and community event. Many of our visitors commented on the warm welcome they received from our P7s that morning.

In term 1 Mrs McCluskey trained the P5/6/7 pupils for the Flahavan's Primary Schools Cross Country League trials and she had a number of P7s who were so enthusiastic and represented our school so well.

In October we also enjoyed a brilliant Glow Party and the pupils and staff were all exhausted dancing the night away.

We had a great anti-bullying week and the children had some excellent discussions with their class.

Four of our P7 pupils worked very hard and sat the AQE transfer tests and achieved some amazing results. We were very proud of you and the effort and preparation that you put in.

In December we had a whole school Carol Service in the church. This was a lovely family evening and many of the pupils narrated and sang. It was an evening to remember. We also took the P7 group on tour to two residential care homes and the residents were delighted with the instrument playing and singing.

We also had a Christmas Jumper Day and raised £190 for Save the Children and had our annual Christmas dinner with lots of singing and fun. We also donated 97 filled shoeboxes to the Samaritan's Purse International appeal.

In January we planted crocus bulbs around the school grounds with the Rotary Club for the Purple for Polio appeal.

We also attended the P6/7 Clounagh Musical - Summer Holiday, this was fantastic.

In February we started our 'Hot Chocolate Fridays' and the pupils enjoyed coming and sitting on our new beanbags having a chat, some hot chocolate and a biscuit with your friends.

In February we had Safer Internet Day and pupils in each class were taught the online safety messages.

In March we had a fantastic Book Week with our annual book fair and earned £568 worth of books for our Accelerated book library. The pupils also dressed up on World Book Day and had some brilliant activities that week.

In March we also had the water bus visit school and P6/7 had a great Victorian Day.

Miss Leonard shared the Roots of Empathy programme with P4/5.

What a busy year we had but there were so many things that we didn't get to experience in the remainder of the year such as the Portadown Music Festival, the swimming gala, the Easter Bop, the many sports tournaments, sports day and of course our P7 residential to the Share Discovery Village.

School was closed on 20th March due to the pandemic. Teachers quickly reverted to remote/online learning through Google Classroom. Daily lessons were posted and work was returned, marked and feedback was given. The staff also made telephone calls to check in on their pupils and parents. SEN classroom assistants kept in regular contact with their pupils by telephone. As well as teaching remotely, the staff continued to provide supervision from March to June for children of key workers.

Throughout the year we reported to parents twice verbally and once in a written report.

NURSERY

2019/20 was another busy year in Orchard County Nursery Unit. The staff led parent information sessions through the Getting Ready to Learn Programme on sleep, attention, nutrition and screen time, speech, language and communication, behaviour and self-esteem, motor skills and sensory awareness

The nursery staff developed a Shared Education partnership with Apple Blossom playgroup through the Sharing from the Start programme. They developed a programme on diversity and inclusion through the use of puppets. Unfortunately, due to the school closure this programme did not get completed.

In term one, nursery pupils, parents and staff had a sponsored walk & refreshments in Peatlands Park to raise money for outdoor resources such as wheelbarrows, a digger, mud kitchen resources, natural fine motor resources, signage and music resources.

In November the nursery had a very well attended open evening. In December all the pupils took part in the Nursery Nativity production.

Throughout the year we were again very grateful for the parents who assisted with activities in nursery and accompanied pupils on their many visits to the train station and train journey, Armagh Planetarium, the library. They had many themed days throughout the year and welcomed visitors such as Debbie Doolittle's Wildlife, Debutots, CEF and Jo Jingles.

SHARED EDUCATION - The CASE Peace IV partnership with St Patrick's PS continued in its third year. All pupils from P1-P7 were involved. The pupils enjoyed many trips and we were able to purchase many new resources through the funding provided. The SE programme was not completed due to the early school closure caused by Covid-19.

Term 1 started with joint staff development training in mental maths and problem solving. Staff embedded this into their daily numeracy planning and lessons. The staff also received an afternoon of Izak9 training in October which developed other mental maths and problem solving ideas. In 2019/20 we had four projects running; P1-P3, P4/5, P5/6 and P6/7 and each project was given a day to plan together at the beginning of September for the year ahead.

Projects

P4/5 - World Around Us (Sept-Oct)

The P4/5 project used World Around Us as their specific subject area and looked closely at the theme of 'Apples'. The children from both schools enjoyed learning about the history of Armagh's Bramley apples and apple tasting as well as incorporating cross-curricular links of numeracy (data handling), art (replicating Paul Cezanne's fruit paintings), ICT (designing and completing a healthy eating campaign poster) and PDMU (The healthy plate). To complete their project, the children enjoyed an engaging and informative trip to the Palace Stables, Armagh for their 'Apple Week' celebrations.

The teachers used the money from this project to purchase ICT equipment for their classrooms which included ten 7" Lenovo Tablets, a wireless visualiser and a Logitech HD webcam. This was so the children could further enjoy collaborative learning and engagement through the use of modern technology - Google Classroom & Collaborate Ultra.

P1-3 - Literacy (Nov-Dec)

The P1-3 project focussed specifically on developing talking and listening skills through familiar tales and genre. Before the project commenced, the FS/KS1 staff met for RISE training; 'Developing Language skills in the classroom'.

The activities each week were varied, painting/drawing/drama/games/writing/DVDs etc. Attention and listening, following instructions and receptive language games were also incorporated into each session successfully. A range of fiction and nonfiction texts including big books and interactive stories provided the children with exposure to a variety of genres. Circle time was very successful in helping the children get to know each other better. Children were able to see their similarities and differences, likes and dislikes and became aware of the things they had in common. The children particularly enjoyed the Theatre Company performance and it provided excellent opportunities for developing communication skills. As part of the Literacy focus included a non-fiction element, a nurse was also invited in to talk to the children. The children worked in groups to decide on questions to ask her. This was an excellent lesson for the development of their communication skills.

After the project the teachers commented that the children's skills in listening and attention were developed considerably through the use of new resources- eg. Puppets, story sequencing puzzles and alphabet spots bought through funding. P1-3 also enhanced their outdoor play facilities by purchasing a pirate ship with funding from Shared Education.

P5/6 - World Around Us (Jan-Feb)

This project focused specifically on RMS Titanic. They began by building on the 2018/19 programme as both classes were involved last year, pupils were assigned into new groups and developed new

friendships. Mixing is encouraged through icebreaker activities. A tour of each school was organised and the days were split evenly between both school settings. Activities were varied and included discussion, questioning, quizzes, practical experiments and discovery learning, art, craft, music, PE, WAU with coverage of Geography (our location, points of interest in journey of Titanic), Science (floating/sinking, temperature measurement of ice melting, effect of salt on ice, making ice-cream, properties of materials water, steel, waterproofing and protective coatings) and History (life in early 20th century considering travel, class system, occupations, education and communication). The emotional impact of the Titanic disaster was dealt with in group discussions and helped open minds to the way we behave in difficult and threatening situations and helped everyone to open up about fears and how they might react in such a challenge. The children enjoyed having W5 Science Show to Orchard County for one of their sessions, where they took part in science experiments together. After the face to face lessons, children then submitted projects that demonstrated an increased knowledge of the topic and the surrounding aspects, improved ICT and research skills.

From the funding, this project bought some more 7" Lenova Tablets for their room and a Logitech HD webcam.

P6/7 - PDMU - Us in the World (Jan-Feb)

Both classes were first to take part in the programme 2 years ago so knew each other well, no need for so many ice breakers. The children had an opportunity to listen to and ask questions of people from 4 different job sectors and were able to complete activities based on sorting jobs into the Private and Public sectors. They developed their research and ICT skills by finding out about their best qualities and assets, helping them decide on a 'dream job'. They listened attentively to the advice of PSNI officer Sue Wright and worked in groups to create an internet safety board game. Lots of great ideas came from this session and it was a good opportunity for the children to show their creative side. The children enjoyed cross curricular links by taking part in a Maths Trail in OCPS and designed a SE Jenga tower with slogans associated with the lessons they had covered during the previous sessions. (Respect, sharing, integration, etc.). Children also enjoyed a mindfulness session from Relaxed Kids at OCPS.

Training

Mrs Kinsella (St. Patrick's) and Mrs Neill (OCPS) took part in G Suite and Collaborate Ultra training in September and November. This training proved very useful when the schools were closed due to Covid-19 as the co-ordinators had trained the rest of their teaching staff on the use of this technology and so it could be used for remote learning.

P6 teachers, Mr Crawford (OCPS) and Mrs Bradley (St. Patrick's) attended 'Developing Effective Sharing Through the Curriculum - STEM in the Primary School' course, in Stranmillis University College, Belfast in October and November. The course was directly related to aspects of their topic, 'Titanic'. This provided excellent support to plan and integrate ICT coding, Science experiments based on water, ice, floating, transport etc. and all appropriate for the age group of our programme. They were able to plan to integrate these new ideas, approaches and skills to their sessions and they were readily received with full participation.

The planned Investigative Maths, Outdoor Play, and Drama and Writing training did not happen.

SE Stage 2 Funding

During term 3 & term 1 2019 The numeracy co-ordinators of both schools completed a joint project on developing Numeracy throughout the school. The staff focused on reviewing the school policies. New numeracy resources were purchased also.

Nursery Shared Education - Sharing from the Start

The nursery staff developed a Shared Education partnership with Apple Blossom Playgroup through the Sharing from the Start programme. They developed a programme on diversity and inclusion through the use of puppets. The staff planned together. Unfortunately, due to the school closure this programme did not get completed.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Following a staff audit, a School Development Plan and detailed Action Plans for 2019-20 were discussed, agreed and presented to the Board of Governors. Link Governors met with subject co-ordinators as they shared their action plans for Year 3 of the School Development Plan to bring about improvements. The plan is amended during the three years to take account of the changing needs of the school. The focus for the year was:

Numeracy- to update the policy, develop the use of Numicon in KS1 and mental maths and problem solving and the use of izak9 in KS2.

Literacy-to promote reading through accelerated reader, book club, book fair, library van visits and World Book Day activities.

ICT- develop online collaboration, digital leaders.

WAU-link topics to the SE programme, develop outdoor activities for Foundation Stage Health & Well Being- promote the daily mile, snack and chat Fridays, Health & Wellbeing champions, P4/5 Roots of Empathy programme. PASS testing with all pupils to help remove any barriers to learning. Review the Positive Behaviour Policy.

SCHOOL POLICIES

The staff, in consultation with pupils, parents and governors have produced a wide range of pastoral care and curriculum policies that are suited to the needs of current legislation, good practice and the Revised Curriculum. This year the following policies were reviewed - Numeracy, Safeguarding, Attendance, Code of Conduct for Staff & Volunteers, Code of Conduct for Visitors, Critical Incidents, Complaints, Critical Incidents, Drugs policy, Educational Visits, Fire Safety update, First Aid & Administration of Medication, Teaching & Non-Teaching handbooks, Health & Safety, Use of Reasonable Force, Health & Well Being and Pastoral Care.

Governors, parents, pupils and school staff have been consulted on all of these.

SCHOOL COUNCIL

Two pupils from each class (P4-7) formed the School Council. They met on a number of occasions throughout the year. They discussed various issues and came up with ideas to improve school life for all pupils. They organised house prizes, researched and ordered new play equipment for break and lunchtimes, new bean bags for Hot Chocolate Fridays, new friendship benches for the MUGA. They met to discuss the new school core values and the review of the Positive Behaviour policy. They decided to partake in the shoe box appeal instead of receiving Secret Santa gifts.

School House Reward System

This year the House Reward System continued, based on a number of different challenges e.g. good manners, good work and behaviour. Pupils were able to earn tokens for their house and work towards a termly prize.

ASSESSMENT

Due to an ongoing dispute over assessment in Primary Schools, Teaching Unions have recommended that schools do not report levels to the Department of Education. Pupils' individual levels were not reported to parents of P4 and P7 pupils.

Pupils in P1 completed Baseline assessments, British Picture assessment and Language Link assessments. P3-P7 completed Standardised Assessments in reading, spelling and CAT (intelligent tests) during term one. Term 3 assessments did not take place due to the school closure. Parents were informed of the outcome of all assessments at the end of year written report. The majority of standard assessment was completed online. PASS testing was introduced for all pupils to assess the mind-set of pupils and help identify any obstacles impacting negatively on pupils' attainment.

ATTENDANCE

The school actively discourages parents from removing children from class during term-time and we acknowledge parental support in the school's excellent 95.4% attendance rate for Nursery to P7 for 2019/2020.

PUNCTUALITY

Punctuality continues to be good for the vast majority of children and we commend both parents and pupils for this. Unfortunately, there are a small number of pupils who regularly arrive late and this is not only detrimental to their own learning but also disrupts the education of others. Picking children up promptly at collection times is also essential to the smooth running of the school. Parental cooperation is greatly appreciated.

YEARLY CALENDAR

The 2019/2020 calendar was again action-packed and busy. The pupils have been provided with a wide variety of opportunities and experiences. Unfortunately, the school year ended on the 20^{th} March 2020 due to the pandemic. The Governors wish to record their appreciation to the staff who provide these experiences for all pupils.
